Take a minute to think about some of the people who help you. Who are they, and what do they do?




Many people help us.

Family Helpers Some children have a sister, cousin, or friend who can help in the same way as a brother. Aunts and uncles are good helpers, too!


He lets me hang around when his friends come over.



My brother and I walk home from school together.


My father cooks dinner and fixes things. He asks for my help, so I'm learning to cook and fix things, too.




