"Well, you've never been on this side of the orange before," said Anita. "I mean *Earth*," she corrected herself.


Anita felt happy, and a little bit excited. She knew things were different in different parts of the world. But she had never thought about a different set of stars.

But our sun is not the biggest, brightest star in the sky. It's just much, much closer to us than any other star. It is the closest star to our planet.



## What Is a Shooting Star?

A shooting star seems to be darting across the night sky. But shooting stars are not really stars. They are pieces of rock or dust. They hit Earth's atmosphere from space. Most burn up before they reach the ground. However, sometimes a part of a shooting star does reach Earth's surface.
