


What has happened in the story so far?

Clouds glowed in the moonlight.




She knew the moon was far away. So it would follow them too!





You have a shadow. Everyone does. You can play games with shadows. You can make shadow animals. You can also use shadows to tell time. Sundials are the oldest way to tell time. They work because shadows have a pattern. They move from one side of an object to the other as the sun moves. The shadow on the sundial tells the time.
