What do we love about animals?








Amira was at the zoo. "It's crowded," she said. "How will I pet the animals?"


"Don't worry," said Grandma. But Amira did.

"I want to pet something," Amira groaned. "Instead, that duck splashed me!"




Why couldn't Amira pet the piglets?

"How can I feed any animals?" she asked. "I can't even pet one!"


"Don't worry," said Grandma. But Amira did.

Amira and Grandma kept walking. It was so crowded! Then they had to stop at a fence.




Suddenly, a baby goat pressed its nose against Amira's hand. Amira jumped.

"And I love the petting zoo!"


"I told you not to worry," smiled Grandma. And Amira didn't.
