Bear went to find more berries. He walked till his feet ached.


But Bear made a terrible discovery.

"Good morning," said Squirrel. "Why is your basket empty?"


"I can't find any berries," said Bear.

"No," said Squirrel. "But I have some walnuts. You can have some."


"Thank you," said Bear. "But I do not want nuts in my pies. They would make the pie crunchy. I will keep searching for sweet berries."

After a lot of effort, Bear realized that there were no berries left.


Suddenly, snow began to fall. Winter was on its way. Bear raced home to his den and put his pies in the cupboard. Then he jumped into bed.

"These fish are too small," thought Heron. "I'm going to wait for a big fish to swim by."


He waited and waited... and waited!
