But the goddess Hera did not like Hercules. She cursed the strong man and caused him to go crazy. Hercules did terrible things in his madness.





At last, Hercules returned to normal. He saw the damage he had done, and he begged for forgiveness. He asked the gods to let him earn back his honor.

The gods agreed, and sent him to work for a king. The king gave Hercules twelve very difficult tasks to perform. He disliked Hercules, and he wanted the hero to fail.



No one thought Hercules could complete all twelve tasks. They seemed impossible. But Hercules did complete them, one by one. He used all of his strength and many tricks, and he refused to give up.


Hercules traveled over land and sea to the edge of the earth. Finally, he came to the secret garden. But how could he pick the apples?



Atlas agreed. He put down the apples and took the weight of the world again. "Thank you," Hercules said, and he hurried off with the apples.






Hercules gave the apples to the king.


Read about real apples.

Apples

Apples grow on trees all over the world. Apples can be red, yellow, or green. They can taste sweet or tart.

This tree grows yellow apples called Golden Delicious.

A group of apple trees is Look at the different parts of an apple.

An apple grows in stages. First, a bud forms on the tree. In spring, the bud blooms into a flower. Part of the flower will develop and grow into an apple.

Most apples are grown from a process called grafting. A farmer follows steps:

- L. Cut a bud from a tree.
- 2. Make a cut in the bark of another tree.
- 3. Peel back the bark.
- 4. Put the bud's stem under the bark.
- 5. Tape the bud and bark together.





Apples are a healthy snack.

People have eaten apples since prehistoric times. Apples probably grew first in southwest Asia. Colonists brought apples with them to America. They are one of the world's favorite crops.

Today, China grows the most apples, and the United States is the second-biggest apple grower. It grows about 5 million tons of apples per year.
