Scene 1

Child I: Yes, the flowers will lose their petals.


Child 2: All the beautiful colors will be gone. It will be cold.

Scene 2 **The Special Basket**



Old Man: I will use my special basket. It can hold plenty of everything.

Child 2: We will dash around the village. We can find colors to collect.

Old Man: I will put this golden sunshine into my basket first.



Old Man: I don't want to boast, but everybody will be so happy when they see what we have done.

Child 3: Why don't you put a piece of the blue sky into your basket?



Collecting More Colors



Child I: Green pine needles would be good.

Old Man: Yes, and some white from the cornmeal that the women are grinding.

I will put that in my basket.

Old Man: I love flowers so much. I will put flowers of different colors into my basket.

Child 2: Those purple, red, and yellow flowers are so bright and beautiful.

Child 3: The flowers are perfect colors to collect!






Old Man: The last thing I will put in my basket is the rich black of the earth.

Child 3: It is a great victory for you! You have saved the colors of summer.

Old Man: Everyone, please come here and see what we have done.

Child 2: Yes, come see the colors we have collected!

Child I: You will not believe your eyes!







Child 3: Please hurry and lift the basket so everybody can see.

Village Person I: Beautiful butterflies are swooping out of the basket!

Village Person 2: They are every color of the rainbow.



Village Person I: The butterflies are fluttering everywhere!

Child I: One landed on my ear. That tickles!

Village Person 2: One landed right on my head! That feels so funny.



Child 2: The beautiful butterflies make me so happy, I want to holler!

Child 3: You must be so proud. We do not have to worry about the coming winter anymore.

Child I: Look at the colors! We have the golden sunshine and the bright blue sky.

Old Man: Can you see the similarities to the things we put in the basket?



Village Person I: The colors of the butterflies all came from nature.

Village Person 2: The butterflies are a gift of color for everybody to share.


Old Man: And that, my children, is how butterflies came to be.

How the Rainbow Was Made
