Fort William finally wins a match!

Are they really the worst football team in the UK?

- It wasn't a big victory, but when Fort William won 5-2 against Nairn County, fans were celebrating. The win follows 73 defeats in a row for the team from Western Scotland.
- 2. The part-time club is trying to move up in the Highland League, but there's still a long way to go. One disadvantage is the young age of their players. "If the players were older and more experienced, the team would win more matches", says one fan. Another fan says the problem is not the player's ages, but their fitness. "If our players were fitter, they wouldn't be so tired in the last 15 minutes of the matches."
- The Highland League includes teams with a wide range of abilities, so Fort William is playing against

- teams with ex-professional players. Of course, Fort William would attract better players if they had more money. A crowdfunding page on Youtube has recently raised £5000 for the team. This isn't much money, but Fort William has fans around the world. If they weren't the underdog, they wouldn't have so much support.
- 4. Players on the team enjoy the friendly atmosphere at training and matches. They are playing for the love of the game. And they may feel that if they won their matches, there would be a lot more stress for them all.
- 5. So, despite the poor scores, it seems that Fort William is, in many ways, a very successful team.



We often use second conditional to imagine how something could be different, even though it's not possible for this thing to change.

- The reality: **They don't win their matches**, so there's not much stress for them.
- What we imagine: If they won their matches, there would be a lot more stress for them.

How does the verb change when we imagine a different reality?

- Note: there are two ways to use the verb *to be* in second conditional sentences with the subjects I/he/she/it. Both are correct.
- If I/he/she/it was/were on the team, I/he/she/it would be the best player.
- We also make contractions with *would* in the result clause like this: If the team won more games, I/you/he/she/we/they'd be really happy.
