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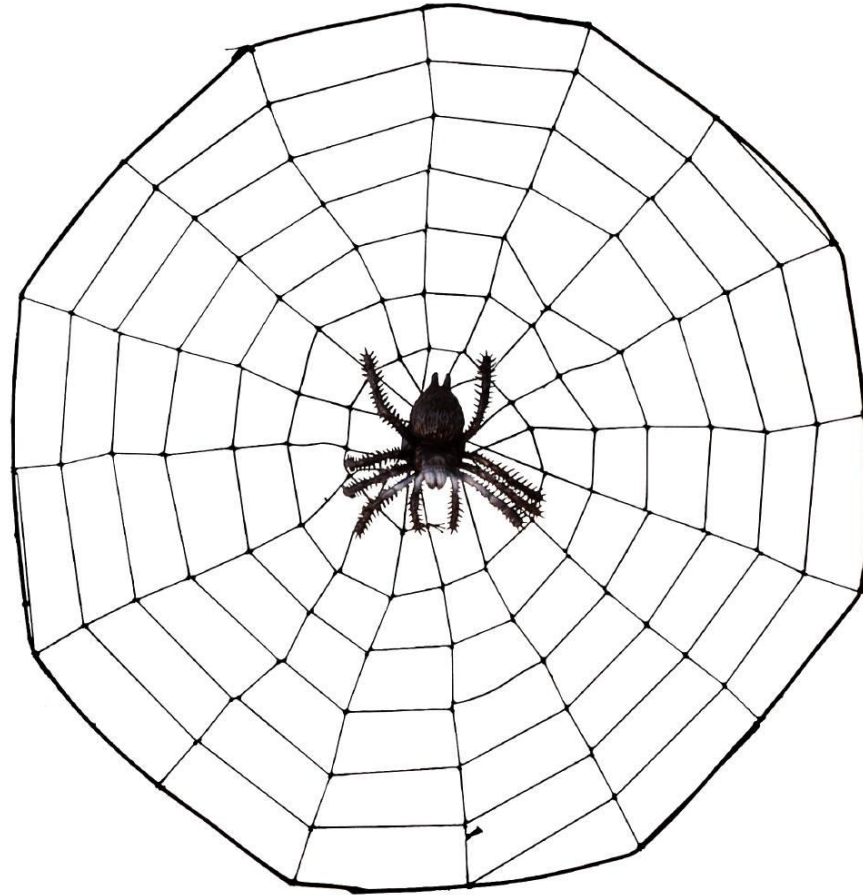

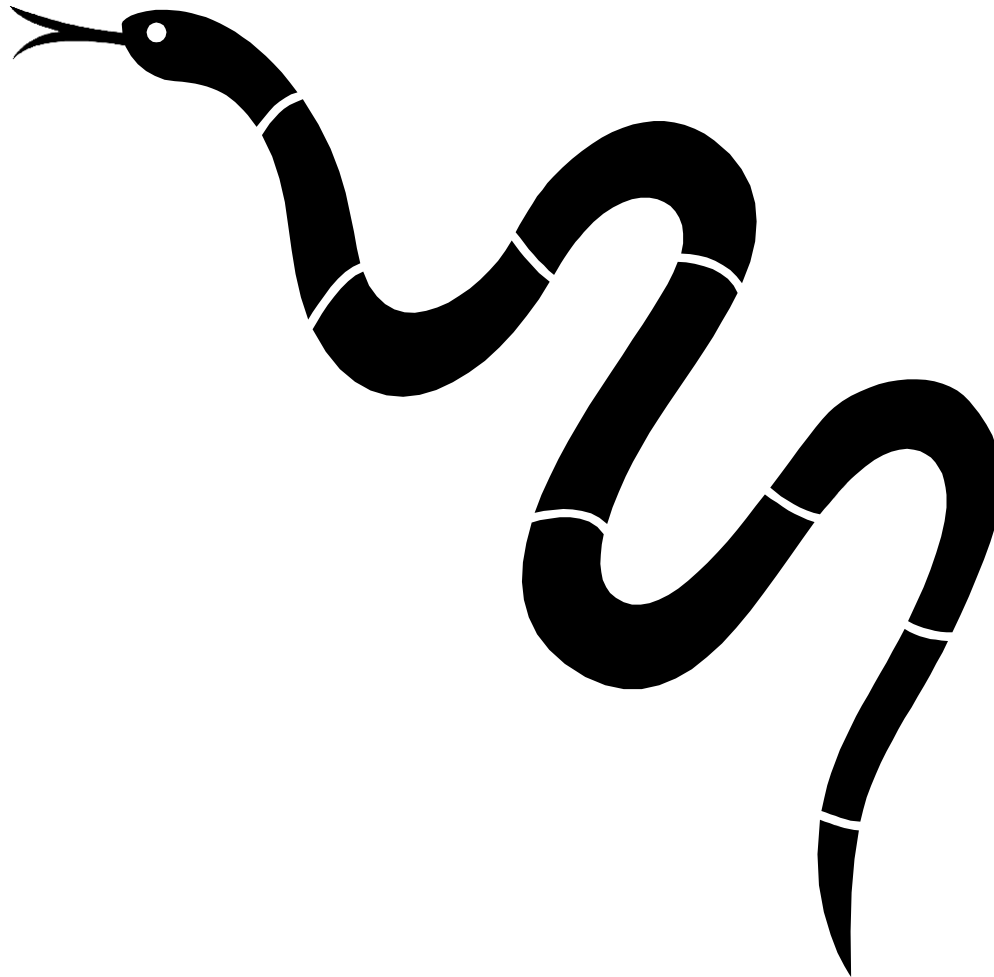

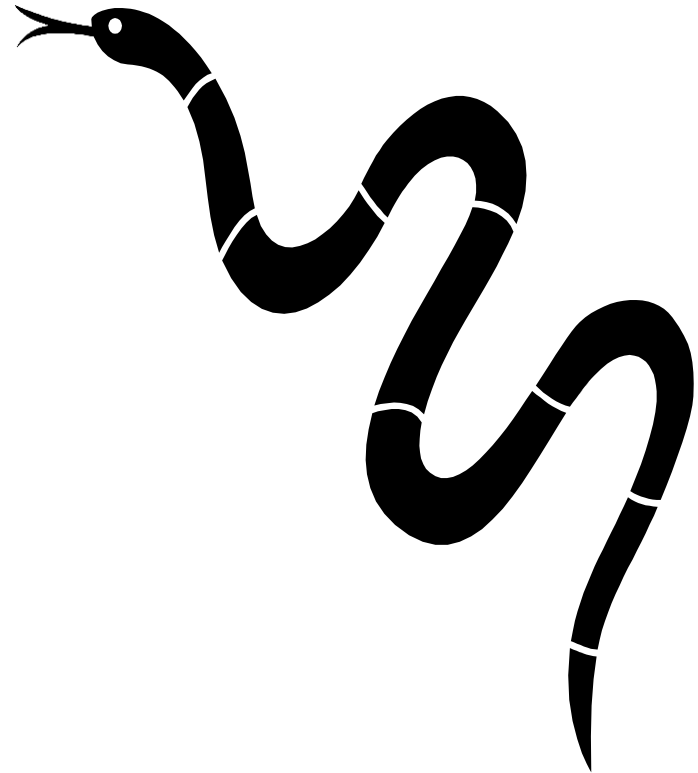

# How to Use

- You can either print the pages out, or show them to the student on a computer, Smartphone, or tablet. My students seem to enjoy viewing it on a computer, phone, or tablet, but do whatever works best for your student.
- Show each page, and you can either tell the student the name of the item, or ask the student what it is (prompting as needed).
- On page 9-11, you can read the instruction, “Tell me something that is black” (or whatever instruction is on the page) and prompt the student (if needed) to tell you something orange on that page.
- On page 12, read the instruction again, and see if the student can tell you something that is that color without the visual prompts.
