

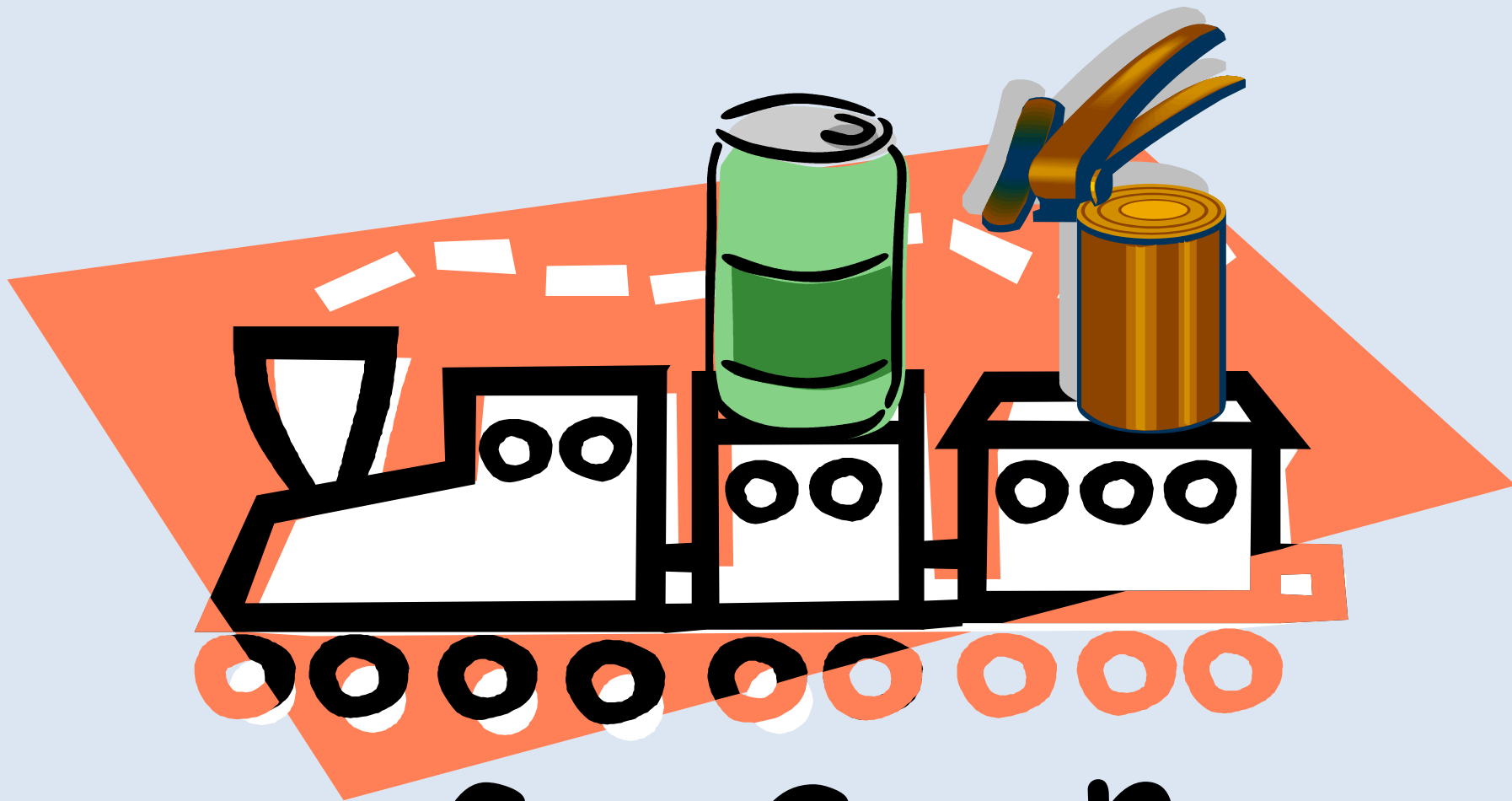

(the picture provides a cue for the word)

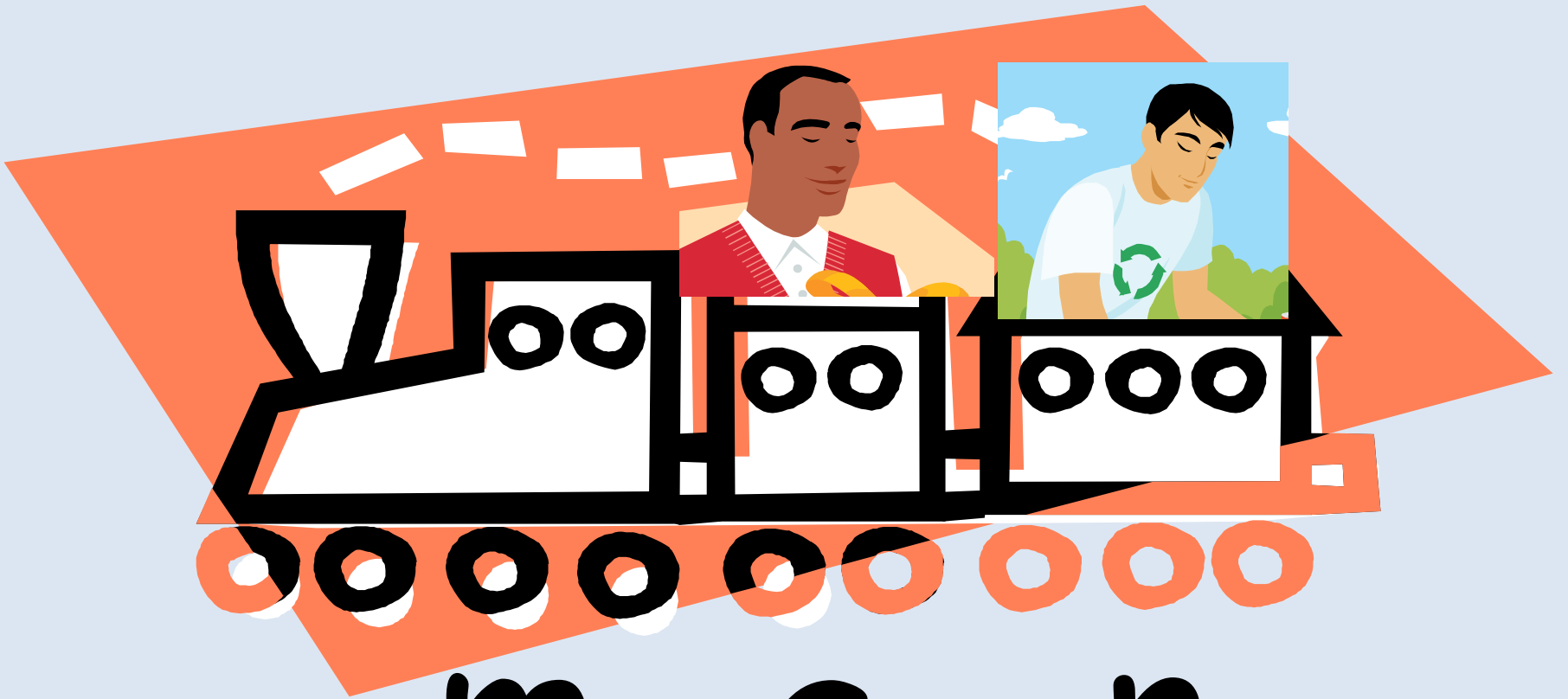

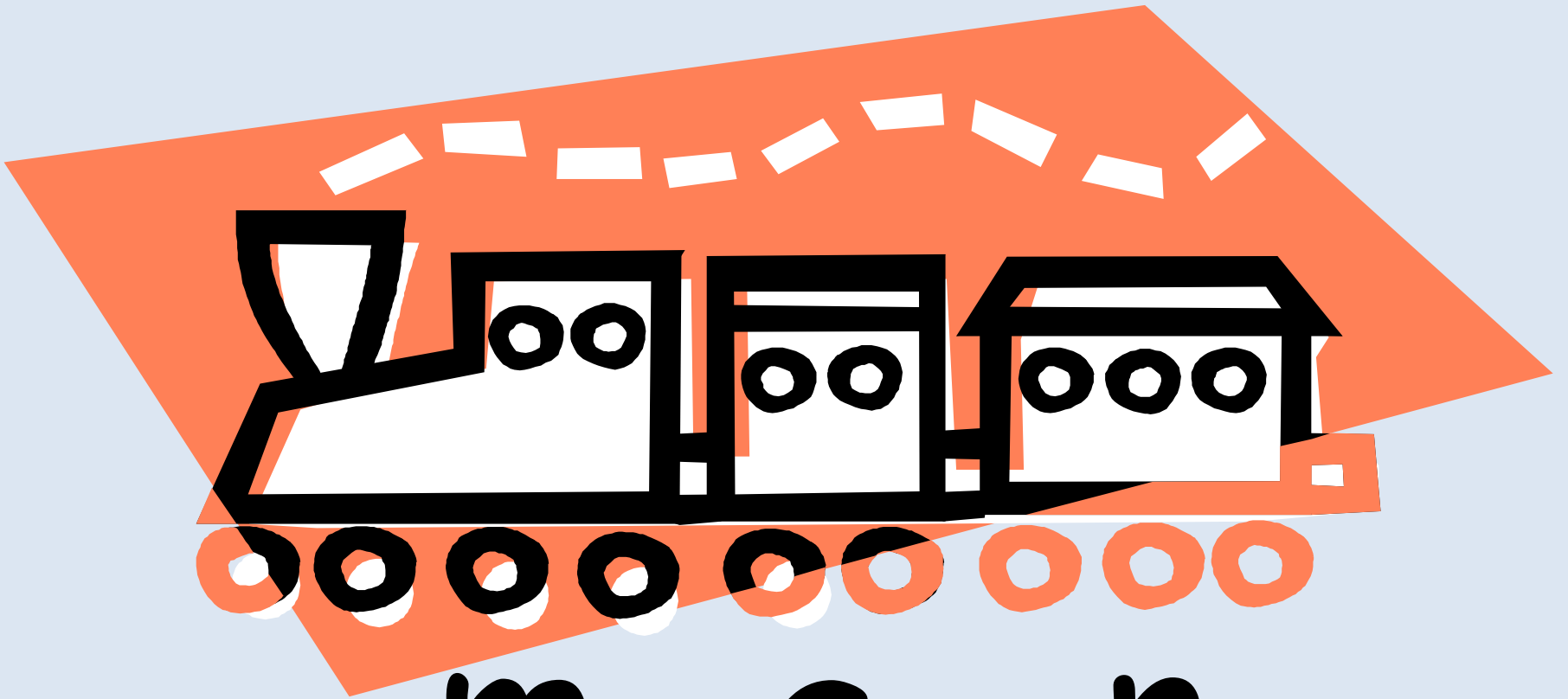
Train Phonics – “an” Words

(student learns to read the word without the picture cue)

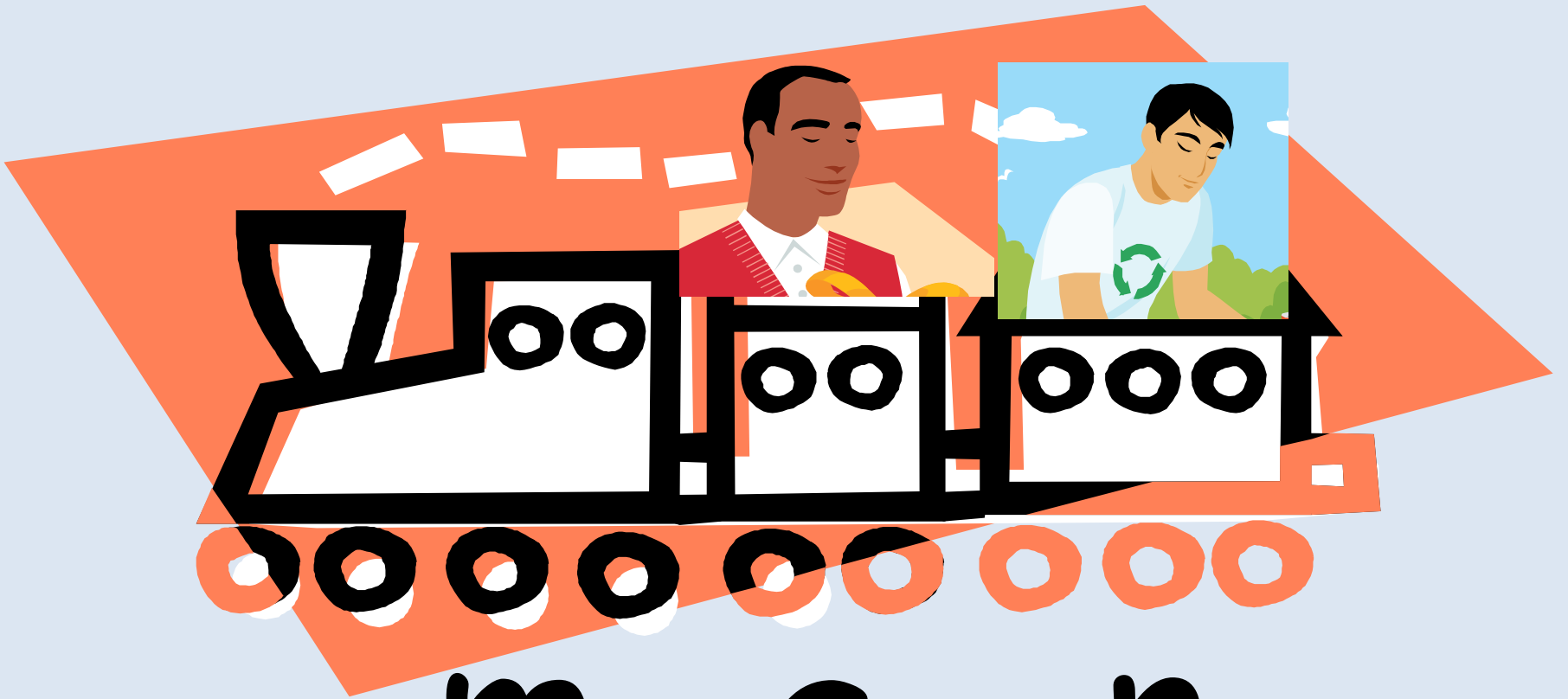
