

# JACK THE RIPPER

#### Passage

Infamous murderer Jack the Ripper killed at least five people in London in 1888.

Never captured, his identity is one of English's most famous unsolved mysteries.

From August 7 to September 10 in 1888, "Jack the Ripper" terrorized the Whitechapel district in London's East End. He killed at least five people and mutilated their bodies in an unusual manner, indicating that the killer had a knowledge of human anatomy.

Known for committing gruesome murders from August 7 to September 10 in 1888, "Jack the Ripper"—a moniker for the notorious serial killer, who was never identified—remains one of England's, and the world's, most infamous criminals.

The culprit responsible for the murders of five women—all took place within a mile of each other, and involved the districts of Whitechapel, Spitalfields, Aldgate, and the City of London—in London's East End in the autumn of 1888 was never apprehended. Despite countless investigations claiming definitive evidence of the brutal killer's identity, his name and motive are still unknown.



The moniker "Jack the Ripper" originates from a letter written by someone who claimed to be the Whitechapel butcher, published at the time of the attacks.

Infamous - adj. having an exceedingly bad reputation

**identity** - *noun* the distinct personality of an individual regarded as a persisting entity; exact sameness; the individual characteristics by which a thing or person is recognized or known; an operator that leaves unchanged the element on which it operates

terrorize - verb coerce by violence or with threats; fill with terror; frighten greatly

mutilate - verb destroy or injure severely; destroy or injure severely; alter so as to make unrecognizable

**anatomy** - *noun* a detailed analysis; the branch of morphology that deals with the structure of animals; alternative names for the body of a human being

infamous - adj. having an exceedingly bad reputation

**gruesome** - *adj.* shockingly repellent; inspiring horror

**notorious** - *adj.* having an exceedingly bad reputation

culprit - noun someone who perpetrates wrongdoing

apprehend - verb anticipate with dread or anxiety; get the meaning of something; take into custody

moniker - noun a familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name)
