

# SEEKING MEDICAL ADVICE IN ENGLISH

Objective: Students will learn to use specific vocabulary which will help them in emergency situations in English speaking countries.

Materials: Use the sheet provided

## Procedure

Warm up: In English, discuss the types of medical problems and emergencies you could encounter while visiting a foreign country. Talk about the precautions you should take before leaving your country. Ask the students what First Aid procedures they know. Ask them if they've ever had a bad experience abroad and had to go to hospital.

1. Explain that today's club activity will help them deal with these



kinds of emergencies by giving them the necessary vocabulary and set phrases that will help them understand medical advice and to fill out the forms at the hospital or dentist.

- 2. Read through the first sheets giving general information. Ask students to highlight any vocabulary they are unfamiliar with.
- 3. Now put them in pairs and give them each the "medical form" and a role-play card. One student should be the "triage nurse" and take the details of the ailment and personal details from the other student. When they have finished, they swap roles. You should monitor their progress and ask questions of your own that you feel would be asked under the circumstances. Encourage the students to do likewise.
- 4. At the end of the activity ask the students if they need any other vocabulary or there's something they want to know.



### Read the text carefully

Many countries give reciprocal free treatment in an emergency, but this is only on the same terms as that received by nationals of the foreign country concerned. This usually applies to state health-care systems, which are not so good in some countries. For members of the EU, there is a special form, which entitles the person to emergency medical care throughout the EU. The procedure varies from country to country and details are given on the form. For anyone cruising extensively, it is highly recommended that a worldwide medical insurance be taken out to cover any treatment required, especially if sailing to countries where medical care is expensive, such as the USA, Canada or Australia. This insurance will also often provide for an ill person to be flown home for treatment, which is a wise option to take if the emergency occurs in a country with poor medical facilities.

# Visiting the UK

If you are a national of the EEA, you will be covered for emergency treatment while temporarily visiting the UK. Free treatment only applies to illness or injury, which arose <u>during</u> the visit. Overseas



visitors who are not nationals of the EEA are liable to be charged for NHS treatment.
